

In the UK we have over 7,723 miles of coastline. That's like flying from the UK to Indonesia!

We have some of the largest tidal ranges in the world, resulting in dramatic changes in water levels. This creates unique habitats.

Responsible rockpooling

When rockpooling, be careful to leave everything as you found it - replace any rocks you turn over, put back any crabs or fish and ensure not to scrape anything off its rocky home.

Did you know?

We have thriving underwater forests in UK coastal waters. Cold-water kelp forests provide a special habitat and shelter for various marine life.
